The **Eucalyptus** genus consists of fast-growing trees native to Australia, widely planted worldwide for their adaptability and various uses.



Height

- **Mature height:** Eucalyptus trees can grow from **10 to 60 meters**, depending on the species. Some species, like *Eucalyptus regnans*, can reach heights of **100 meters**, making them some of the tallest trees in the world.

Uses

1. **Timber:** Eucalyptus wood is used in construction, flooring, and furniture due to its durability.
2. **Paper and pulp:** The wood is extensively used in the paper industry.
3. **Medicinal:** Eucalyptus oil, extracted from the leaves, is used in **aromatherapy, cold and flu treatments, and topical ointments** for pain relief.
4. **Environmental:** The trees are planted for **soil erosion control and reforestation** projects due to their fast growth and adaptability.
5. **Honey production:** Eucalyptus trees provide nectar for bees, making them valuable for **beekeeping and honey production**.

Religious Importance

- In some indigenous **Australian Aboriginal cultures**, eucalyptus trees hold spiritual significance, symbolizing **strength and healing**.
- **Eucalyptus leaves** are sometimes used in **cleansing rituals** and **smudging** to purify spaces or for their medicinal properties in traditional practices.
- While not deeply embedded in major religions, the **soothing scent and healing properties** of eucalyptus oil are used in **aromatic rituals** for promoting well-being.
